## Chaplain's Corner: What You Can Do?

On January 20, 1961, newly elected President John F. Kennedy gave his inaugural address. The still famous line from that speech was: "Ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country." This was a call to all citizens of this nation to public service, to do what one could for our country. It was and is an honorable thing to serve one's country as most of our Legionnaires can testify.

Times have changed since then and the attitude of Americans, a majority, has changed with it. Now, it seems, "what my country can do for me" is about the only thing many people care about. There is a sense of entitlement, an attitude of "I'll just sit back and let others do all the work." That is not a recipe for success in America, nor at Post 164.

Let me be clear about this. No one should be expected to do everything, to participate in every event and work party that takes place at the Post. There are some things that some people cannot do due to age or infirmity. Time can also be a factor for those still working. However, if all of us would pitch in where we are able, a lot more would be accomplished.

When Sandy and I were raising our two boys, the work of the family was divided up according to ability. As the boys grew stronger and learned more skills, they were given more complex tasks to do. Now, I have reached an age where I find it difficult to do those things that once were easy for me. Now, my sons help me with some of those tasks that I once took on my own shoulders. We raised them to honor the family and to help each other whenever there was a need.

Our Post is also a family and the same rules apply. When something needs to get done, those who can should pitch in. We have seen some of that lately with the crew who is manning the kitchen several nights a week. That is the kind of service that is good for the Post and, therefore, good for the Post family. We need to see more of that and those who are doing it ought to be thanked, personally, for their service.

I have heard it said that some people believe they are supporting the Post family by drinking beer and playing the games of chance. If you are one of those, please be assured that you are NOT supporting the Post. At best you are supporting the canteen, but even that is very limited support. The Post family is more than just the canteen. We are an organization that is responsible for promoting national pride in our community. All three branches (Legionnaires, SAL and Auxiliary) provide financial support to causes that promote this ideal. But there are many who do little or nothing to contribute to this mission and that is a shame. It is shameful for the person(s) who choose not to participate and that shame reflects on the rest of the Post family.

So, let's say you are one of those people and you don't know what you can do. Here's is how to get started: Ask any of your officers in any of the three branches of the Post what you can do to serve. I believe that most of them will be able to guide you toward some activities that need help. Here are some thoughts to get you started:

- Volunteer to work in the MASH garden.
- Volunteer to help in the kitchen. With more people we could expand the number of nights we are open and that would attract others to come into the Post.
- Ask to be put on a list of people to be called whenever work projects are occurring.
- Volunteer to help with lawn care. If we had an all-volunteer crew to mow

- the grass and keep the yard looking nice, we could save a lot of money that could go to pay for needed repairs and maintenance.
- Come to your respective membership meetings and help make decisions for the Post.
- Serve on a committee such as the Events committee, the Americanism committee, etc.
- Become a leader in the Post family by taking on an appointed office or running for an elected office in your respective branch.
- Volunteer for the Honor Guard. That puts the Post in a very positive view.

There are many other things you could do as well. It is said that 80% of the work in any organization is done by 20% of the people. You could be one of the 20%. Even better, you could help increase that 20% to 25%, 30% or even more.

One final thought: Over the years, I have found that when people work together, they become closer. They begin to have a better opinion of each other and are more willing to help each other. They truly become a family. If you have never experienced this kind of fellowship, you are missing out on one of the greatest feelings one could ever have in this life.

So, to paraphrase JFK: “Ask not what your Post can do for you, but what you can do for your Post.” Together, we can make it the best Post in the nation, not because of how fancy our Post is but because of how much the members of our Post love each other. I look forward to working with each of you as we continue to make our Post better and better.
